## Letter from Father

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21 January 2024 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time There Is Still Much Work To Be Done

## Greetings,

For the last 49 years, people from all backgrounds, faiths, and political persuasions have gathered in our nation's capital for a massive demonstration called the March For Life. This march became necessary when the Supreme Court of the United States ruled in Roe v. Wade that the barbaric practice of abortion was to be legal in every state. This decision has had some very serious repercussions on the life of our nation.

Prior to Roe, each state had the power to make its own abortion laws. Roe stripped that power, making abortion legal federally through all nine months of pregnancy for practically any reason. While it's a major step in the right direction, overturning Roe does not end abortion. Overturning Roe returns the ability to protect the unborn back to the American people through their elected officials both federally and in the states.

Even with the wonderful blessing of Roe v. Wade being overturned, which allows more freedom at the state level to enact pro-life laws, the necessary work to build a culture of life in the United States of America is not finished. Rather, it is focused differently. Sadly, the number of abortions annually is still well over 900,000 each year, and that number is expected to decrease only by roughly 200,000 each year in a post-Roe America. Many national legislative battles loom, including even keeping longstanding Hyde protections, which limit government funding for abortion on annual appropriation bills. The Hyde Amendment has saved over 2 million lives and is arguably the most impactful pro-life policy in our nation's history, but now it cannot be taken for granted. Ultimately, our most important work is changing hearts and minds. We are called not only to change laws at the state and federal level, but to change the culture and ultimately make abortion unthinkable.

In our own state of Washington, we are challenged by a state government which seems hell-bent on being a national leader in keeping abortion legal. In response to the Supreme Court decision, our Governor, Jay Inslee, tweeted, "Not here, not in our lifetime. Washington is and will remain pro-choice. And we will not slow down in the fight to ensure safe, affordable access to every person who needs it." The Department of Health has gone to great lengths to ensure that not only will abortion remain legal in our state but they will encourage women from states that have made abortion illegal to come here for abortions. My question is, do will we really stand for being labeled as a leader in abortion services? Is that what we want people to think about when they think of Washington? We have a great deal of work left to do.

As with every endeavor, great and small, it is imperative that we begin with prayer. You may have noticed that we pray for an end to abortion in every Mass at Holy Family. You must do the same in your homes and other settings. If you belong to a group of friends who gets together, pray with them for an end to abortion. Pray the Rosary every day for an end to abortion. As St. Theresa of Calcutta so eloquently advised us, "You must do three things: pray and pray and pray.

Next, we must use our voices to speak up against this terrible evil. If you are eligible to vote and are not registered, register. If we are to make abortion illegal, on the way to making it unthinkable, we have to elect holy, pro-life representatives, senators, governors, and presidents. And we must hold them accountable to do the political work of protecting life. It is only through the sin of apathy that the supporters have risen to such positions of power and it will be up to people of good will to effect a change

Finally, be a supporter of the gift of life. Pray for women who are experiencing crisis pregnancies. Offer to help young families when Mom and Dad are overwhelmed with their new responsibilities Support programs for women and couples that provide education, assistance, and care for these new families. We are God's hands to do His work in the world and it's time we get those hands dirty with this vital work.

Life is our greatest gift and most precious resource, please commit yourself to being a partner in protecting it wherever you go.

## Proclaiming the Gospel of the Kingdom

In these early weeks of "ordinary" time, we are being introduced to Jesus and the beginnings of his public ministry.

Matthew tells us four things about Jesus' ministry
"When Jesus heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew to Galilee. He left Nazareth and went to live in Capernaum by the sea. ..."

The relocation of Jesus northward from Judea up to Galilee tells us of the hostility of the southern regions to the message of John the Baptist and Jesus. The religious ruling class in Jerusalem and the Hero dian dynasty felt threatened by the popularity of John the Baptist and Jesus. So Jesus moved north to less hostile and more fertile territory in order to begin his public ministry.

There is an important lesson in this: While we must carefully preserve Christian orthodoxy and only accept doctrinal development that is organic and faithful to the received Apostolic Tradition, we can inadvertently stifle the Holy Spirit, who speaks to us through unexpected people and in unexpected ways Sometimes we can insist upon a single position in matters in which Christians are allowed freedom.

For example, there are various degrees of expression permitted in the liturgy; there are also different schools of theological thought that are allowed by the Church.
"From that time on, Jesus began to preach and say, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.'"
To those who make light of sin and their condition as sinners, Jesus says, "Repent."
Many today say repentance is "unwelcoming." But Jesus said it anyway. He calls us to understand our condition and need for mercy and grace. We are also told that the Kingdom of heaven is at hand: that the grace and mercy of God are available to rescue us from this present evil age; from the kingdom of dark ness; and grant us admittance to the Kingdom of light.

If you don't know the bad news, the good news is no news. So the Church must announce the call to repentance, but must also offer hope and mercy to sinners.
"As he was walking by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon who is called Peter, and his brother Andrew, casting a net into the sea; they were fishermen. He said to them, 'Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men.'"

In building his kingdom, Jesus summons men to follow him. He will train them to be the leaders of his Church as apostles.

The kingdom of God is not just concerned with calling disciples, but also with developing leaders to provide order and authority in the Church. The Lord builds on something they know: fishing. He starts with the familiar in order to draw them to the less familiar. In a way, he is saying that the gifts they are currently using are just the ones they need to use as leaders in God's kingdom.

He went around all of Galilee, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the gospel of the kingdom, and curing every disease and illness among the people."

Note that all of Galilee was his mission field, and he covered it comprehensively. Soon, he will send them to the ends of the earth. He also cured people of every disease and illness.

So the Church is catholic, with a small " $c$ " (meaning universal) and addresses every part of the world, providing a comprehensive vision for life. We seek to bring healing, and where physical remedies are not possible, the truth of the Gospel reassures us that every suffering, faithfully endured, brings forth glory.
