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
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

The 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Do you believe that God loves you? Perhaps that's an odd question to ask a group of people gather for Sunday Mass. But perhaps you have experienced this; it is so easy to experience the love of those closest to you. For example, I have no doubt that my parents love me, I have no doubt that my siblings for the most part love me. I don't even think about it day in and day out and you can begin to take it for granted. When is the last time you stopped for a moment and actually realized the love that God has for you?

Think about it, God gets nothing out of you and I being here. He doesn't need us; He is perfect all on His own, yet He still chose to place each and every one of us in the world. Every time we walk into this church, we are reminded, when we see Jesus hanging on the cross, how much He loves us. Not only did He freely, choose to place us in this world, when our hope was lost because we messed it up, He came into this world and died for us.

My friends it is important for us sometimes to step back to realize the great length to which God loves us. Because you see God's love has consequences for how we live our life. When we stop and recognize the great love God has in putting us here, the great love He has in redeeming us on the cross, it clearly shows us that He wants what is good for us. He wants us to flourish, not just in this life, but more importantly in the life to come. So, as we stop and recognize that love it becomes the lens through which we should hear today's gospel. If your eye causes you to sin, pluck it out, if your hand causes you to sin, cut it off. Of course, Jesus isn't speaking literally, He is using the rhetorical device of hyperbole, He is speaking in exaggeration to make His point known. Why, because God loves us and wants what is best for us. He doesn't want anything getting in the way of achieving what He has planned for us.

You see often times when you ask someone what it means to sin, they will say "well you hurt God". No, "God is only offended by us, when we act against our own good." Sin holds us back, sin keeps us from attaining what God has in store for us. So, if we can step back and realize the great lengths that God went to love us, we begin to see that these commandments, laws, and rules are there for a purpose, they are there so that we can reach that potential.

So, in today's gospel when we hear Jesus tell us to pluck out our eye or cut off our arm, He is telling us do whatever it takes to avoid falling into sin. Don't allow anything to get in the way from acting the way you should, from achieving that potential that He has given you. Friends, most of us are very good, when it comes time to go to confession to step back and look at our sins, but that is only the first step. Today's gospel calls us to go further. It causes us to ask ourselves what are those things that cause me to sin and then to cut them out; to root them out of our lives. Why? Because as the psalmist reminds us, the precepts of the Lord gladden the heart. These rules God has for us really do keep us at our fullest self.

We have all heard the famous phrase that the best defense is often a good offense. Today Jesus challenges each of us to go on the offensive. Not just to repent of our sins, but to do whatever we have to so that we don't fall into sin. What is your eye, what is your hand, what is your foot? What are those things, that are leading you into sin? Those are the things that we need to cut off and cast aside.

If you have ever worked with someone recovering from addiction you discover they often only begin to get traction in their recovery when they move beyond not wanting to get into trouble and discover there is someone they don't want to disappoint. When I was younger, I didn't break the rules because I didn't want to get in trouble, but as we get older, we realize it's not so much about not wanting to get in trouble as it is letting certain people down. Maybe you have those people in your life that if you let them down, they don't even have to say a word, all they have to do is give you that look and you immediately feel bad about it.

My friends, Jesus reminds us that there is nothing more important in this life than heaven. Nothing should get in the way of us achieving that place He has prepared for us and that means we need to make changes in our life. So, as we stop and hear Jesus in this exaggerated phrase, of plucking out your eye and cutting off your hands and feet, we are invited to step back and ask, what are my eyes, what are my hands, what are my feet, what are those things that lead me into sin and how do I root them out of my life? Afterall, God has given us everything, He has given us the gift of His love. He wants what is best for us, the challenge for us then is to root out sin; to root out those things that are not good for us, those things that hold us back from the relationship He wants for us. What are those things in your life that lead you into sin?

Letter from Father

29 September 2024 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time Time to Remember

Greetings,

My letter for the past two weeks has been rather heavy so this week I'll write about something a little lighter.

Country music singer Billy Dean starts one of his song with the lyrics, "I'm going to hold who needs holding, mend what needs mending, walk what needs walking, though it means an extra mile; pray what needs praying, say what needs saying because we're only here for a little while." The song, "Only Here for a Little While" is a reflection made at the graveside of his friend who died too young and the regrets that he might have had. The singer vows to remember what is important in life as he continues to live in the world.

One of the greatest gifts that God has given to us, His creatures made in His image and likeness, is the gift of memory. Of all the earthly orders of creation, only we possess the fullness of this ability to remember. There is even a saying which sums this up: "Memory is God's gift to those who are limited to living in time." God has no need for memory because for Him, all is an "eternal now." We do not have that characteristic, but our consolation is the ability to keep in our minds the memory of so many people and experiences that are, and have been, a part of our lives.

This human characteristic of memory finds an important place in the Word of God. In the 10 Commandments, given by God on Mount Sinai, the third commandment is given: "Remember to keep holy the Sabbath day" (Exodus 20:8). Indeed, the word "remember" often has a meaning in Scripture that is associated with some form of worship. The concept of memory, which we find in the Old Testament, has an even stronger meaning than the one we usually associate it with in English. When the Jewish people partook of the Passover meal, for instance, they were conscious of partaking in something which was not merely a remembrance of a past event, but the actual reliving of that event in time. This liturgical concept of memory culminates in our Lord's gift of the Eucharist at the Last Supper. The words "Do this in memory of me" (Luke 22:19) are filled with a deep understanding of memory. When our Lord commanded his Apostles to 'do this in remembrance of me,' it was not a matter of merely recalling his supper but of renewing his own Passover sacrifice of Calvary, which already, at the Last Supper, was present in a way that would have meaning even for us two-thousand years later.

Very often, memory impels us to gratitude. While I didn't know him for very long, I am grateful for the memory of our late pastor, Fr. Richard Root. His death came as a surprise and made me consider how important it is to not take for granted the time that we have here on Earth. I am inspired by the care that he took of so many people: his ailing mother, many parishioners who were struggling with various issues, the care he took of Holy Family Church, and, in his retirement, the help he gave to our retired parishioners, saying Mass on most Sundays at Evergreen for the people there who couldn't make it to Mass here. HE really was mindful of what God calls all of us to do for each other.

That is Fr. Root's lasting legacy to our parish and to the Church. He did leave a physical legacy here as well. Our columbarium and social hall were made possible because of his vision and leadership for Holy Family. While his earthly remains are appropriately interred in the columbarium, I felt it was right and just to honor his memory by dedicating the social hall in his name. Next Sunday, after 9:00 Mass, we will unveil the plaque which dedicates the hall and its use to Fr. Root's memory and service to the Church. I invite all of you to join us for a moment of community memory, thanking God and asking for His blessing.
