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

St. Teresa of Jesus, Virgin and Doctor of the Church Feast Day is October 15th.

Teresa de Cepeda y Ahumada was born in 1515 in Spain. She is also known as St. Teresa of Avila. Her parents were both Christian, and her mother especially raised her as a pious Christian. Teresa was fascinated by the accounts of the lives of the saints, and ran away at seven with her brother Rodrigo to find martyrdom among the Moors. Her uncle stopped them as he was returning to the city, just outside the city walls. She went on to become a prominent Spanish Mystic, a Saint, and entered the Carmelite Order. She along with St. John of the Cross founded the Discalced Carmelites.

As a Cloistered Carmelite Nun, she suffered greatly from illness. Early in her sickness, she experienced religious ecstasy. She claimed that during her illness she rose from the lowest stage, "Recollection", to the "Devotions of Silence", or even the "Devotions of Ecstasy", which was one of perfect union with God. During the final state, she said she frequently experienced a rich "blessing of tears". She realized the distinction between mortal and venial sin, and came to understand the awful terror of sin and the inherent nature of original sin. She also became conscious of her own natural impotence in confronting sin, and the necessity of absolute subjection to God. She began to inflict various tortures and mortifications of the flesh upon herself. In 1559, she became firmly convinced that Jesus Christ presented Himself to her in bodily form, though invisible to others. The visions lasted uninterrupted for more than two years. In another vision, a Seraph Angel drove a fiery point of a golden lance repeatedly through her heart, causing an ineffable spiritual-bodily pain. This memory served as an inspiration throughout the rest of her life.

St. Teresa's mystical thought throughout all her writings is the ascent of the soul in "Four" stages. The first is "Mental Prayers", devout contemplation or concentration, the devout observance of the Passion of Christ. The second is the "Prayer of Quiet", where the human will is lost in that of God by virtue of charismatic, supernatural state given of God, while the other faculties, such as memory, reason, and imagination are not yet secure from worldly distraction. The third is "Devotion of Union", not only a supernatural but also an "ecstatic" state. Here there is also absorption of the reason in God, and only the memory and imagination are left to ramble. This state is characterized by a blissful peace, a sweet slumber of at least the higher soul faculties, a conscious rapture in the love of God. The fourth is "Devotion of Ecstasy or Rapture", a passive state, in which the consciousness of being in the body disappears. Bodily senses cease; memory and imagination are absorbed in God or intoxicated. Body and Soul alternate between a fearful fiery glow, a complete impotence of unconsciousness, sometimes by such an ecstatic flight that the body is literally lifted into space. She was said to have been levitating during Mass on more than one occasion.

St. Teresa is one of the foremost writers on mental prayer, and her position among writers on mystical theology is unique. In all her writings on this subject she deals with her personal experiences, which a deep insight enabled her to explain clearly. Her definition was used in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, "Contemplative prayer in my opinion is nothing else than a close sharing between friends; it means taking time to frequently being alone with Him whom we know loves us". Throughout her writings, persistent metaphors provide a vivid illustration of the image of the mystic prayer as "watering a garden".

The last three years of St. Teresa's life, she founded Convents at Andalusia, Palencia, Soria, Burgos, and Granada. In total, she founded sixteen Convents, and as many men's cloisters were due to her reform activity of twenty years. Her final illness overtook her on her journey from Burgos. She died in 1582, just as Catholic nations were making the switch from the Julian to the Gregorian Calendar. Her final words were, "My Lord, it is time to move on. Well then, may your will be done. O my Lord and my Spouse, the hour that I have longed for has come. It is time to meet one another". In 1622, forty years after her death, Pope Gregory XV canonized her. Pope Paul VI in 1970, along with St. Catherine of Siena, was named "Doctor of the Church", the first two women in the Church to receive this title. St. Teresa is revered as the Doctor of Prayer. Her mysticism in her works exerted a formative influence upon many theologians of the following centuries.

Practical Take Away

St. Teresa of Jesus was a Carmelite Nun that was profoundly spiritual. She along with St. Catherine of Siena became the first two women to be named "Doctor of the Church" by Pope Paul VI. She is known as the Doctor of Prayer, and revealed a pathway for us to pray, in four steps. The first being Mental Prayer, Prayer of Quiet, Devotion of Union, and the forth bing, Devotion of Ecstasy or Rapture. She has many writings that walk us through the higher level of prayer, using her own experiences as an example for us to follow. She went on and founded seventeen convents, and was a promoter of the faith until her death in 1582.

Letter from Father

13 October 2024 28th Sunday in Ordinary Time Fathers, Forget Not your Duty

Greetings,

On Friday, at our daily Mass, I noted an interesting statistic. Other than yours truly, there were no men at Mass. Now, this isn't always the case but I have noted that men are the definite minority in our daily Masses. This got me thinking about how much does the Church encourage men to do what she asks of them and then help them to do it?

We often hear the saying, "The mother is the 'heart' of the family but the father is the 'head' of the family". What then should every man who is called to the marriage vocation work towards so that indeed he can live out what is true "fatherhood" in a world of "drop-out dads", negligent fathers, and overly timid men?

First, to be a good father he should first be a good "Son of God the Father". The Father of the family represents and reflects the image of God the Father. If a father isn't sure of himself spiritually, then he will not be able to transmit to his children and family an authentic vision of God the Father. However, if a father has encountered God the Father in an intimate and convincing way then he will be able to transmit this fatherhood to those whom God will place under his care.

Second, after placing primary emphasis on his relationship with God the Father, a true father should love his wife. The love and friendship that he has with his wife should be indispensable. This love should not stagnate. On the contrary this human love blessed supernaturally by the sacrament of Matrimony should grow, and flourish. All too many marriages lose their vibrancy; the love grows cold to the point that both live in the same house as if they were strangers to each other. Obviously, the children will suffer the consequences!

How can spouses maintain the flame enkindled and burning bright? As in any activity, sport, or profession, the relationship between spouses demands great effort. both spouses should cultivate a deeper relationship with God through Prayer (both individual and family), the Sacramental life (frequent confession and Holy Communion); devotion to Mary manifested by the daily recitation of the Holy Rosary are all vital parts of growing in a mutual relationship with God.

Third, the father should love his children and has the primary purpose of bringing them to their ultimate destiny which is heaven. An authentic father first should provide for the spiritual needs of the child. He should teach his child to pray as soon as possible through the help of a good father, absorb that which is pure, noble and uplifting.

The father should be the teacher to the child especially in prayer. With respect to the art of prayer, the father should apply three practices of prayer. He should be a man of prayer and not be afraid to manifest it publicly. He should pray with his family; prayer before meals, the family Rosary, and actively participating in holy Mass which is of course the greatest of all prayers. And, finally, a true father should pray frequently and fervently for his family for their protection from all evils—physical, moral, spiritual—and for his family's sanctification and salvation.

An authentic Christian father should have his eyes fixed on heaven at all times and stay aware of the world and the dangers that menace the family entrusted to him. The greatest desire of the father for his family should be the salvation of their immortal souls. Jesus said, "What would it profit a man if he gain the whole world and lose his soul in the process? What can we offer in exchange for our immortal soul?"

Until men reclaim the essential role of the father in the family to his proper place the world will suffer intensely. Man, who is called to the vocation of marriage assumes an enormously important responsibility. The end of the vocation is holiness of life and the heavenly reward.

However, man (the father) must strive daily to cultivate a deeper relationship to God. His wife must be cherished as his greatest gift on earth. Then, as God sends them children, they should be raised and formed in the Faith. The father must receive them willingly from the hands of the Father. They should be formed by the father emotionally, intellectually, morally, but especially spiritually. Indeed, the father should do all in his power to instill in them a deep-rooted Fear of the Lord, but even more, a tender and loving trust and love for our Heavenly Father. We pray for the intercession of Saint Joseph, and beg for his powerful intercession. St. Joseph, ornament of the domestic life, patron of families, patron of fathers, pray for us.

Safety Drills:

Throughout the school year we practice safety drills each month. We use the Standard Response Protocol, which is the same protocol that businesses and other schools use. We have yearly training & meetings with our local law enforcement to keep up on current information. (See attachment)

Every month we practice fire drills in the elementary, and with that we have additional drill practice. Today we practiced a lock down drill and what to do if something unsafe is in the building: doors locked, lights off & out of sight. We especially practice the importance of listening to our teachers & being able to be quiet and follow directions quickly in emergency situations.

K-3 had a special assembly this week to learn about fire safety with the Clarkston Fire Department. Do you practice safety drills at home? Do your children know where to go in an emergency if they have to leave your house? These are important topics to practice before there is an emergency.

Next week we will participate in the Great American Shakeout (Earthquake Drill) on 10/17 @ 10:17 a.m. This is a state-wide day of practice. Businesses & schools register to practice at the same time. Drop ~ Take Cover ~ Hold On!
